- 4. **Duration:** Day 1, 1 hour. Day 2, up to 2 hours.
- 5.**Grade:** K-6.
- 6. Content Area & Core Standards: Social Studies, Language Arts, Science.
- 7.Resources / Materials needed: science experiment,
- "Bartholomew and the Ooblek" by Dr. Suess.
- 8. **Vocabulary:** honor, race, segregation, prejudice, discrimination, equality, civil rights, courage.
- 9. Differentiation: team science experiment, language arts.
- 10. Motivation/Anticipatory Set: Day 1, Olympic images. Day
- 2, science experiment relating to segregation.
- 11. Assessment/Rubric: Students understanding will be recognized at the end of lesson during the writing and/or art projects.
- 12.**Preparation:** Review lesson and prepare for assessments of your choice. We recommend watching the docudrama "Taking Chance" to prepare to teach honor for our veterans. (click title for link)



What does Honor mean?

LET class discuss, then share definition.

#### Vocabulary Word

**Honor:** an expression of respect for a person with high standards or conduct.

When I see the American Flag I stand to show honor for our liberty.

Did you perform with high standards and conduct?

Medals are SYMBOLS of **strength and character.** There is a very

SPECIAL MEDAL given to **American Soldiers.** It is the highest medal you can receive and is called the MEDAL OF HONOR. It is GIVEN TO SOLDIERS who have shown "gallantry in action".

They have been **injured or killed** and risked their own lives to save the lives of others.

We honor ALL SOLDIERS on Veterans Day. A VETERAN is a person whom has served in the military. MEN AND WOMEN serving in the military fight to protect the freedoms we enjoy in America, and the medal of honor goes to the most valiant of these men and women.



Introduction: WE HAVE learned about the brave men and women in our military whom we honor for bringing us the daily freedoms we enjoy. They are the only Americans who can receive the special Medal of Honor. We cannot receive the Medal of Honor, but we can honor all people in America.



Would you like to a become a person with **honor?** 

WE can begin this process by **using honorable** words. GATHER the students around and **read "Bartholomew and the Oobleck"**, by Dr. Suess (or retell in your own words). BECAUSE of Bartholomew, the King learned some very special **magic words**.



Has anyone ever asked you to "say the magic words"?



What magic words are they talking about?





**Children** may RESPOND with (please, I'm sorry, thank you, abracadabra).

TELL them you know, like Bartholomew knew, some of **the best magic** 

words are the simplest words like:

..."I'm sorry".

#### Science Experiment

TELL THE CLASS you are going to make some oobleck together.

(Make the oobleck together or have pre-made in several gallon zip-locks so the students can feel and see it being hard or soft.)

Oobleck is like our words, they can be HARD or SOFT

America's Day 2 Lesson Plan Team

AS the children work with the **oobleck** EXPLAIN and discuss how our words can be hard and hurt others or soft and make others happy. WHEN we are on America's Honor Team we need to know when to say the SOFT words like **I'm sorry.** 



Why do we say the magic words "I'm Sorry"?



Have you ever had to say I'm sorry to anyone on your family team? class team? baseball team?

Have the students LEAVE the oobleck and gather to look at the images as you tell them a story about our Honor Team.


THERE WAS A TIME in **America's history** where our


AMERICA NEEDED a most valuable

She sat in the **first row of seats for people with black skin**. The **bus was full** of passengers, there were even some people standing. **At the next stop** more men with white skin color boarded the bus. There were no seats available so they told Rosa Parks to **stand up and move**. Rosa Parks said **10.** The police arrived and


